		<p>1 WRITING</p> <p>Start a list of things to do this week. Talk about it and decide who will do each.</p>	<p>2 PLAYING</p> <p>Make a collage. Cut out shapes and let your child arrange them on a piece of paper. Use a glue stick to secure them to the paper.</p>	<p>3 TALKING</p> <p>Talk about the weather today and what you should wear to go outside.</p> 	<p>4 SINGING</p> <p>Sing "good morning" using the Happy Birthday song.</p> <p><i>Good morning to you, good morning to you. good morning (child's name), good morning to you.</i></p>	<p>5 COUNTING</p> <p>Work with your child to draw an imaginary monster. Ask your child how many arms, eyes, teeth? What color?</p>
<p>6 READING</p> <p>Go to the library and take out a new book. Talk about new words you come across while reading the new book.</p>	<p>7 WRITING</p> <p>Write a grocery list together. Walk around the kitchen checking what you might need and add it to the list.</p>	<p>8 PLAYING</p> <p>Take a walk outside. Collect colorful leaves. Try to find as many different types as possible.</p>	<p>9 TALKING</p> <p>Use interesting new words. For example, <i>delightful</i> in place of <i>good</i>; <i>voracious</i> in place of <i>hungry</i>, <i>scrumptious</i> in place of <i>delicious</i>.</p>	<p>10 SINGING</p> <p>Take turns singing bits of the alphabet song.</p> 	<p>11 COUNTING</p> <p>Trace the hand of each person in your family. Whose hand is bigger? Whose is smaller?</p>	<p>12 READING</p> <p>Spot letters on license plates today. Call them out as you see them.</p> 
<p>13 WRITING</p> <p>Write your child's name in big letters. Decorate the page and hang it where they can see it.</p>	<p>14 PLAYING</p> <p>Play "I Spy" with rhyming words.</p> <p><i>I spy with my little eye something that rhymes with pie. What is it? Yes, Sky!</i></p>	<p>15 TALKING</p> <p>Make flashcards with pictures of objects, animals, or actions. Ask your child to name what they see or describe what they see.</p>	<p>16 SINGING</p> <p>Sing "Five Little Speckled Frogs."</p> <p><i>(Words are on the back. ➡)</i></p>	<p>17 COUNTING</p> <p>Pick a point in your house or on your block. Count the steps to get there.</p> 	<p>18 READING</p> <p>Hold a favorite book upside-down or start reading it backwards. Talk about what is "wrong" with the way you are reading the book.</p>	<p>19 WRITING</p> <p>Work together to plan a walk around your neighborhood. Draw a map before you go and use it while you are walking.</p>

Create a menu together.</p> 	<p>21 TALKING</p> <p>Use interesting expressions. <i>I'm all ears</i> in place of <i>I'm listening</i>.</p>	<p>22 SINGING</p> <p>Sing "Five Little Ducks."</p> <p><i>(Words are on the back. ➡)</i></p>	<p>23 COUNTING</p> <p>Count the pumpkins you see today.
