



A Chickasaw woman who can't catch a break serves up a little white lie that snowballs into much more. A first novel. Original.




























Moon of the crusted snow: a novel

by Diane Wilson - WILSON


A haunting novel spanning several generations, The Seed Keeper follows a Dakhóta family's struggle to preserve their way of life, and their sacrifices to protect what matters most.



by Lisa Bird-Wilson - BIRD-WILSON


