FROM THE DIRECTOR

I'm writing to you this month from our nation's capital, where I am attending ALA's National Library Legislative Day. Alongside my colleagues from across California, I'm meeting with the offices of Senator Adam Schiff, Senator Alex Padilla, Representative Mike Thompson, and other members of our congressional delegation.



While we are walking the halls of Congress, our focus remains firmly on you—our neighbors in Sonoma County. We are advocating for vital federal programs that underpin the services you use every day.

Why Federal Support Matters Locally

Federal funding isn't just a line item; it stretches our local dollars further and sustains programs that change lives right here at home:

Early Literacy: With only 41% of our local third graders reading at grade level, we are advocating for full funding of the *Innovative Approaches to Literacy Act* to strengthen Sonoma County Library's partnerships with our local schools.

Closing the Digital Divide: Through the *E-Rate program*, we secure the discounts necessary to provide high-speed Wi-Fi in every branch—a lifeline for our rural, coastal, and re-impacted communities.

Workforce & Rural Support: Funding from the *Library Services and Technology Act* (LSTA) supports our job development efforts and provides specialized services for older adults and rural residents.

Justice & Reentry: The *Prison Libraries Act* would provide \$10 million annually to modernize facilities and expand digital literacy. Locally, we already partner with the County to provide services at the Juvenile Justice Center and adult detention facilities. Federal funding would bolster these efforts, helping us expand educational access and reentry programs that reduce recidivism and create a safer, more cost-effective community for everyone.

How You Can Help

Our mission is to ensure that every Sonoma County resident, regardless of age, income, or location, has access to the tools of opportunity.

If you believe in the power of libraries to transform lives, please contact your federal representatives. Ask them to fully fund these essential literacy and technology acts. Investing in our libraries is a direct investment in the future of Sonoma County.
